Glenn County Sheriff's Office Organizational Structure

The Glenn County Sheriff's Office is located at 543 W. Oak Street, Willows, CA, and the Jail facility is located adjacent at 141 S. Lassen Street, Willows, CA. The business office is open weekdays from 8:00am to 5:00pm excluding holidays. The dispatch center and jail are staffed 24 hours a day, seven days a week, and can be reached by telephone at (530) 934-6431, (530) 865-1122 or (530) 934-6428. The 911 emergency lines are always available.



The Glenn County Sheriff's Office is composed of three (3) divisions: Operations, Support Services, and Jail. The Sheriff and Undersheriff are responsible for the administration and oversight of the division commanders.

Operations Division

The Operations Division consist of Uniformed Patrol and Special Operations, which includes Traffic, Boating Enforcement, Police Aides/Assistants, Civil Unit, Court Security Unit, and Animal Control Unit. The Operations Division in commanded by a lieutenant, and there are currently 3 sergeants, 1 detective, 11 deputies, 2 county service officers, 1 bailiff, 1 service clerk, and 4 public service employees assigned to the division.

Support Services Division

The Support Services Division consist of the major crimes unit, narcotics unit (G.I.N.T.F.), evidence and property management, internal affairs, emergency services, volunteer services, communications, records, and clerical. The Support Services Division is commanded by a lieutenant, and there are currently 1 Administrative Services Officer, 3 detectives, 2 deputies, 1 California Highway Patrol Officer, 4 emergency dispatchers, 3 service clerks, and 3 public service employees assigned to the division.

Jail Division

The Jail Division consist of the Glenn County Jail facility and transportation unit. The Jail Division is currently commanded by an acting lieutenant, and there are 1 correctional sergeant, 4 correctional corporals, 15 correctional officers, 1 food manager, 1 cook, 1 service clerk, 1 supervising secured facilities maintenance technician, and a contracted medical unit assigned to the division.

The Year in Review

2012

2012 was an eventful and challenging year for the Glenn County Sheriff's Office. We were able to complete some significant projects, we experienced a sizeable amount of staff changes, and through it all continued our unswerving effort to provide the very best service to Glenn County.

In January of 2012, the Sheriff's Office took over command of the day to day operations of the Glenn County Inter-agency Narcotics Task Force (G.I.N.T.F.) due the downsizing of the State's Bureau of Narcotics Enforcement (B.N.E.). This further strained an already decreased staff requiring a Sheriff's lieutenant to assume those duties. The Sheriff's Office also lost their civil process server, taxing a patrol deputy with all the requirements of civil process.

By utilizing grant funding through Homeland Security, the Sheriff's Office was able to complete an upgrade to the law enforcement radio system by adding voters to Hamilton City, Butte City, and Red Mountain. These voters work in conjunction with existing voters in Orland, Willows, and on the County's Needham Grade Repeater site. The voters relay radio signals to a comparator located in the dispatch center, which then utilizes the best signal; thereby, increasing the effectiveness of the radio communication.

Funding through Homeland Security also provided for the migration of all of the county's first responder's and essential services (including Planning and Public Works') radios to a "narrow band" frequency status as required by the FCC. This huge undertaking began with coverage mapping provided through CALSIEC (an arm of CalEMA) to preview what impact this change in frequency would have on radio coverage throughout the county. An inventory of hundreds of radios followed to determine what equipment was capable of being narrow banded. By the end of September all radios had been reprogrammed keeping the County in compliance with FCC regulations.

Homeland Security grant funds also provided for the replacement of the California Law Enforcement Telecommunications System (CLETS) interface, and purchased two roadside programmable sign boards.



As the County's primary E9-1-1 PSAP (Public Safety Answering Point) the Sheriff's Office replaced the nine year old analog E911 phone system in the emergency dispatch center with a new, state of the art, voice over internet protocol (VOIP) digital 911 phone system utilizing funding from the State's Public Safety Communications Office, 9-1-1- Emergency Communications Division.

In addition the Sheriff's Office took part in the State 9-1-1's "Next Generation" 9-1-1 program which provides an IP based network which allows for capabilities such as location based routing showing the latitude and longitude of the call within 500 feet, policy based routing and dynamic call routing between Public Safety Answering Points (PSAPs). Additionally, future applications like text, video, and photos will become available. Backroom equipment was installed and call testing was completed. The "Center" is now receiving wireless calls from Verizon users on this new product.

2012 saw many new faces at the Glenn County Sheriff's Office, and the departing of many years of experience and dedication. Civil process server Michael Hamilton retired, actually on 12/31/11, after 19 years of service, supervising office tech and civil specialist Nikki Termine retired after 32 years of service, and emergency dispatcher Joyce Trammel retired after 25 years of service. The Sheriff's Office also saw the departure of Deputy Darren Dicharry, and correctional officers Steve Bertagna, Lavada Nelson, and Lester "Buck" Squier.

Emergency dispatcher Pauline Spooner and Deputy Shawn Williams transferred over to the Civil Unit to try and fill the abyss of losing over 50 years of experience. Sean Arlin was promoted to




Lieutenant, Robert "Barry" Corbin was promoted from County Service Officer to Deputy Sheriff, Sonia Melgarejo was promoted from Correctional Corporal to Correctional Sergeant, and Greg Norwood was promoted to Correctional Corporal. 
