


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# Glenn County Sheriff's Office Organizational Structure

The Glenn County Sheriff's Office is located at 543 W. Oak Street, Willows, CA, and the Jail facility is located adjacent at 141 S. Lassen Street, Willows, CA. The business office is open weekdays from 8:00am to 5:00pm excluding holidays. The dispatch center and jail are staffed 24 hours a day, seven days a week, and can be reached by telephone at (530) 934-6431, (530) 865-1122 or (530) 934-6428. The 911 emergency lines are always available.



The Glenn County Sheriff's Office is composed of three (3) divisions: Operations, Support Services, and Jail. The Sheriff and Undersheriff are responsible for the administration and oversight of the division commanders.

## Operations Division

The Operations Division consist of Uniformed Patrol and Special Operations, which includes Traffic, Boating Enforcement, Police Aides/Assistants, Civil Unit, Court Security Unit, and Animal Control Unit. The Operations Division in commanded by a lieutenant, and there are currently 3 sergeants, 1 detective, 11 deputies, 2 county service officers, 1 bailiff, 1 service clerk, and 4 public service employees assigned to the division.

## Support Services Division

The Support Services Division consist of the major crimes unit, narcotics unit (G.I.N.T.F.), evidence and property management, internal affairs, emergency services, volunteer services, communications, records, and clerical. The Support Services Division is commanded by a lieutenant, and there are currently 1 Administrative Services Officer, 3 detectives, 2 deputies, 1 California Highway Patrol Officer, 4 emergency dispatchers, 3 service clerks, and 3 public service employees assigned to the division.

## Jail Division

The Jail Division consist of the Glenn County Jail facility and transportation unit. The Jail Division is currently commanded by an acting lieutenant, and there are 1 correctional sergeant, 4 correctional corporals, 15 correctional officers, 1 food manager, 1 cook, 1 service clerk, 1 supervising secured facilities maintenance technician, and a contracted medical unit assigned to the division.


2013 was a difficult year filled with change at the Glenn County Sheriff’s Office; however, the women and men of the Sheriff’s Office faced the challenges and continued to provide the best possible service with the resources available.

One of the biggest obstacles during the year was the continuing budget reductions. Although the Glenn County Board of Supervisors were true to their commitment of making public safety a priority, the lack of revenues forced the Sheriff to reduce the agency’s general fund expenditures by roughly one million (\$1,000,000) dollars. In order to meet that reduction, the Sheriff was forced to move personnel out of the Operations Division and place them in special funded areas. One (1) detective and one (1) deputy were moved to Court Security, one (1) detective was moved to Narcotics, one (1) deputy was moved to Boat Patrol, and one (1) deputy was moved to a new AB109 program in the Jail. Ordinarily, those positions would be filled with additional deputies instead of depleting street patrol and investigations.

On a more positive note, the Sheriff’s Office was involved in some progressive change. Through the use of State grant funding, the Sheriff’s Office was able to provide high quality body worn video cameras to Sheriff’s deputies and both City Police Departments. The video cameras are excellent tools to improve officer safety and can be an invaluable source of evidence. Research has shown that agencies utilizing body worn cameras have significantly decreased sustained officer complaints.

The Sheriff’s Office has also partnered with the Glenn County Office of Education, Glenn County Mental Health, and the Orland and Willows Police Departments in a new S.T.A.R.T (School Threat Assessment and Response Team) program. The program, spearheaded by GCOE Superintendent Tracy Quarne, is designed to identify, intervene, and help people who may pose a threat to schools before there is a critical incident.

The Glenn County Jail continues to see an increase in the average daily population (APD) due to the AB109 realignment. There was a new alternative custody sentencing program (ACS) implemented this year in an effort to mitigate the population growth. The ACS program utilizes ankle monitoring and direct supervision. The program provides in-home incarceration and offers social behavior and education resources that give low level offenders the opportunity to learn valuable life skills. The goal of this program is to reduce recidivism, which should ultimately reduce the jail population.



The Jail staff has also partnered with the Probation Department and the Courts to implement a pretrial release program. The program utilizes risk assessment along with ankle or GPS monitoring to allow persons not yet convicted to remain out of custody while still taking step to ensure their appearance in court.

During 2013 there were many new additions to the Glenn County Sheriff’s Office, and the parting of several valued veterans. The most tragic was the untimely passing of Bailiff Rachel Duckett.

Rachel served the County and the Courts for over 27 years. She will be sorely missed by all. The Communications Center saw a vast change with the retirement of another long term emergency dispatcher James Hinde. At times, that left only three full-time emergency dispatchers to try and cover the Communications Center 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Fortunately, with the help of Civil Clerk Pauline Spooner and some help from recent retirees Joyce Trammel and Nikki Termine, we made it through. However, there is still a long way to go in rebuilding the expertise and experience in the Center. During the year we were able to hire emergency dispatchers Kristin Lemmon, Kassidy Honea, Keren Sites, Callie Lausten, and Sara Alejandre. Unfortunately, April Wood, Kassidy Honea and Sara Alejandre also left during the year.

The Jail witnessed the retirement of Lt. Tim Asbury and Service Clerk Karen Brown. Sgt. Jim Miranda was promoted to Lieutenant, but due to budget constraints the Sheriff was unable to fill the vacated service clerk position. Correctional Officers Miguel Guerrero, Megan Roenspie, Robert White, Alberto Vargas, James Marshall, and Chrystal Basye were hired during the year; however, we also lost correctional officers Sharon McKenzie, Rachael Bertagna, Jay Overholtzer, Pete Crocker, Miguel Guerrero, and Chrystal Basye.



Furthermore, long term County Service Officer Steve Wadsworth departed the agency, and correctional officer Grant Lemmon was transferred out of the Jail and into the vacated County Service Officer position. Gilberto Mojica was hired as a Sheriff's Deputy, but left prior to completing his training. His position was unable to be filled due to lack of funding.

Through it all, the members of the Glenn County Sheriff's Office have continued their effort to provide the very best, most professional law enforcement service possible. Even though there may be an occasional setback, we continue our effort to move forward and learn from our mistakes. And, always, we remember our devotion to the community we serve and strive to continually live by our motto:

Average Daily Population




